

## eBike Grant Fund – Round 1 successful applicants

The Transport Scotland eBike Grant Fund – Round 1, closed for applications on 19 August. Cabinet Secretary Michael Matheson announced on 2 October that over £470,000 was allocated to 19 different projects throughout Scotland, from Ayrshire to the Highlands.

- Glasgow City Council: 63 ebikes for public hire scheme (Nextbike) – £176,623
- Hope Amplified: 15 ebikes – £14,786
- Transition Linlithgow: 3 ebikes for community FiXiT Hub – £6,497
- Happy and Healthy: 6 ebikes – £9,864
- Glasgow Kelvin College: 3 ebikes – £5,771
- Edinburgh and Lothians Regional Equality Council: 5 ebikes – £6,553
- Bike for Good: 5 ebikes (includes one ecargo bike) – £13,642
- North Ayrshire Council: 5 ebikes (includes one ecargo bike) – £8,399
- University of Strathclyde Student Association: 6 ebikes – £14,405
- South Lanarkshire Culture and Leisure: 18 ebikes (includes 3 ecargo bikes) – £23,330
- The Laggan Forest Trust: 3 ebikes – £1,640
- Clydebank Housing Association: 5 ebikes (includes 1 ecargo bike) – £4,345
- Arran Eco Savvy: 6 ebikes – £11,706
- Kirknewton Community Development Trust: 2 ebikes – £4,598
- Scotland's Learning Partnership: 12 ebikes – £15,000
- Loch Lomond and Trossachs Countryside Trust: 2 ebikes – £5,941
